

MOOSE ACCUSED OF LIQUOR IN LODGE

Officers Face Charges of Ordinance Violation Before Oregon City Court.

PLAINTS FOLLOW RAIDS

Detectives, One ex-Member of Order in Boise, Gather Evidence—All to Appear to Make Plea Today When Trials Are to Be Set.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 1.—(Special)—All the officers of the Moose Lodge, No. 361, and F. D. Cox, pool hall proprietor, were made defendants today in complaints drawn by City Attorney Schuebel, charging them with violating the city liquor ordinances.

The lodge officers, Cox, William Myers, who is Cox' partner, and W. Reynolds, steward of the lodge, will appear before City Recorder Loder tomorrow morning. Leo Pong, before the Recorder of Oregon City today, and Ernest E. Jones, before Recorder Porter, of West Linn, each entered a plea of not guilty and will be tried Friday.

The complaints issued today bring the total of those who now face liquor charges following yesterday's raids up to 14. The officers of the lodge are C. S. Noble, dictator; Ed Brady, vice-dictator; P. Barlow, prelate; H. A. Shandy, treasurer; F. L. McGanhey, secretary; Ben Eby, inner guard; Al Richardson, outer guard, and Frank Busch and Charles Baker, trustees.

Police Make Demands.

Abolition of the bar which is alleged to have been installed in the lodge-rooms is demanded by the city officials. The door of the lodge-rooms must be left open, say the police.

As an indirect result of the raids, Clem Dollar and J. E. Morgan, two members of the lodge, were arrested yesterday on a charge of using abusive language and convicted before Recorder Loder. Each was fined \$10 and 30 days in jail, but the jail sentence was suspended.

The two detectives, using the names of H. E. Bradley and Carl Wilson, posed as members of the Moose Lodge and were in the clubrooms when the raid was made. Bradley is a former member of the lodge in Boise, Idaho. Wilson made an application to join here on the recommendation of Bradley.

Handshake Opens Lodge Doors.

When the raid was made, both Dollar and Morgan were in the rooms. They are said to have denounced the two detectives for the part they had played in working up the case against the lodge.

"It was easy as far as the lodge was concerned," said Bradley today in discussing his two weeks' work. "I was a member of the lodge at one time in Boise and knew the handshake. As soon as I reached town I told several members that I was a Moose, gave them the brotherly grip and they took me in the lodge."
